Status of Agency Accreditation

Background:

On February 25, 2009 the Board of Directors adopted the 2008-2013 Strategic Plan. At the heart of that Plan was the goal to achieve *Commission on Fire Accreditation International* (CFAI) Accreditation by thoroughly assessing District practices and comparing our effectiveness next to the best practices in the industry. For nearly two years prior to the adoption of the Strategic Plan the District had been taking significant preliminary steps in anticipation of this goal.

Present Situation:

The District has assembled and trained a team of more than eighty personnel to complete the self-assessment portion of the accreditation process. The process is organized around a traditional ICS structure which is attached for your review. The District's Five-year Business Plan is also being revised during this discovery process and will be before the Board for comment and approval in the coming months.

Staff is also in the final draft stage in the development of the Standards of Cover (SOC) document – a key component in the accreditation process. The SOC provides a comprehensive, systematic and consistent way of looking at the emergency services provided by an agency. It is anticipated that this document will be before the Board for consideration in November.

The District remains on track for CFAI Candidate Status and an onsite assessment team visit in the first quarter of 2010 and a public hearing before the full commission in August of 2010.

Background:

The District has budgeted for the construction of the (1) Station 36 Annex, (2) New Station 32 and (3) the acquisition of 4-Type 1 Engines, 4-Type 3 Engines and 2-Ambulances. In order to efficiently finance the cost of these projects and acquisitions, staff is exploring various financing options. During the evaluation period prior to the issuance of debt to finance these projects, certain costs will be incurred. It is staff's recommendation to fund these cost from the proceeds of the future debt.

United States Income Tax Regulations Section 1.150-2 allows for the pre-debt costs to be reimbursed from the debt issuance proceeds. A resolution of the Board of Directors declaring the District's intent to reimburse costs is required.

Recommended Board Action:

Adopt the attached resolution declaring the intention to reimburse expenditures from the proceeds of bonds to be issued by the San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District for Station 32, Station 36 Annex and apparatus acquisition.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SAN RAMON VALLEY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT DECLARING INTENTION TO REIMBURSE EXPENDITURES FROM THE PROCEEDS OF BONDS TO BE ISSUED BY THE SAN RAMON VALLEY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT

WHEREAS, the District proposes to undertake the project referenced below, to enter into a lease financing using certificates of participation (referred to herein as the "Bonds") for such project, and to use a portion of the proceeds of such Bonds to reimburse expenditures made for the project prior to the issuance of the Bonds;

WHEREAS, United States Income Tax Regulations section 1.150-2 provides generally that proceeds of tax-exempt obligations are not deemed to be expended when such proceeds are used for reimbursement of expenditures made prior to the date of issuance of such obligations unless certain procedures are followed, one of which is a requirement that (with certain exceptions), prior to the payment of any such expenditure, the issuer declares an intention to reimburse such expenditure from the proceeds of obligations issued after such expenditure has been incurred; and

WHEREAS, it is in the public interest and for the public benefit that the District declares its official intent to reimburse the expenditures referenced herein.

NOW, THEREFORE, it is hereby DECLARED and ORDERED, as follows:

- 1. The District intends to issue the Bonds or cause the Bonds to be issued for the purpose of paying the costs of and constructing: (i) acquiring fire suppression and emergency services vehicles and equipment; (ii) the construction of Fire Station No. 32; and (iii) construction of an annex to Fire Station No. 36 (together, the "Project").
- 2. The District hereby declares that it reasonably expects (i) to pay a portion of the costs of the Project prior to the date of issuance of the Bonds, and (ii) to use a portion of the proceeds of the Bonds for reimbursement of expenditures for the Project that are paid before the date of issuance of the Bonds.
 - 3. The principal amount of the Bonds is expected to be approximately \$11,200,000.







Gentlemen, I received a phone call yesterday from the wife of a patient that you treated and transported on August 27th (see attached incident report). Her name is Diane Anderson. She ran into Ken Schwartz in the grocery store before she called me and told Ken how grateful she and her husband were for the treatment you provided. Ken directed her to me -- you may have already heard this from Ken but I assured her I would let you all know about the conversation I had with her.

Mrs. Anderson told me that had you not made the decision to transport her husband to a trauma facility (JMMC) rather than the closest facility (SRRMC), he would have died. This statement was made to both Mr. and Mrs. Anderson by the doctor at JMMC who treated Mr. Anderson (Dr. Michael deBoisblanc). Dr. deBoisblanc informed Mrs. Anderson that her husband required 40 units of blood in order to survive, which is more than is immediately available at SRRMC as they are not a trauma destination. He also told Mrs. Anderson that upon listening to the call (and I'm not sure exactly what is meant by this - monitoring radio traffic, perhaps) that he could tell a paramedic of great experience and competence was caring for Mr. Anderson. Mr. Anderson was recently released from the hospital and when he gets a little stronger he might like to come see you and thank you in person.

You guys really make a difference.

Over the past seven months, my wife and I have been working with the fire department on mitigation measures at both the proposed new Station 32 and the surrounding homes. These measures have focused on limiting the impact to surrounding neighbors from increased noise and lack of privacy without impacting the functionality of the station.

This working relationship has included a site visit by the architect, fire chief, and assistant fire chief to our home; collaboration on the design with Chief Price and the architect; and a preliminary acoustical report by Wilson, IHRIG & Associates as to the typical sources of noise in a fire station and potential areas of impact.

In the April board meeting Chief Price described us very accurately as a "reluctant" neighbor to the proposed relocation of Station 32 to 2100 Stone Valley. We have three main concerns:

- 1. Noise Impacts to our home from sirens, horns, backup alarms, idling, and loud conversations.
- 2. Privacy Impacts to our home and pool as the station will sit above our property and existing vegetation is not dense enough, nor does it exist year around, to create an adequate barrier.
- 3. Loss in Property Value due to a fire station moving into a pre-existing residential area where values were set prior to the existence of such station. This has been estimated at 10-15% of the home value, or \$160,000 to \$240,000.

The acoustical engineer's report suggested specific mitigation measures for the station, which we assume the SRVFD would implement. These measures include the orientation of the building; using sound walls around the yard which connect to the building; and using materials that are sound absorbing on the face of the station as well as in/on the sound walls. Nevertheless, the proposed station does not fully address our concerns.

We believe it is in everyone's best interest to address our concerns and gain our support. We request the following additional mitigation to gain our support for the project:

1. Remove our existing back fence and build a new eight-foot wooden fence with evergreen vines. An eight-foot sound wall is a preferred solution but that would add 50-60K to the cost and we are trying to cooperate with the fire department and be reasonable.

- 2. Prepare ground and plant large evergreen trees and shrubs on our property to provide adequate privacy year round to our backyard, pool, and 2nd story bedrooms and bathrooms.
- 3. Retrofit the 2nd story of our house to lessen the impact of sound.
- 4. Two months moving expenses for having to relocate while 2nd story is being retrofitted.

We estimate that these proposed additional mitigation measures would cost \$123,000 dollars.

This is a very difficult situation for my entire family. We found our dream home a year ago, picked up our family, and moved to Alamo. Never in my life would I have put my life savings into a home in an affluent community like Alamo if I had known it would be next to a fire station. Worse yet, because there was no fire station planned at the time we purchased our home, we stand to lose \$160,000 to \$240,000 in after tax dollars due to your desire to build a new station at 2100 Stone Valley Blvd. Unfortunately, this is the reality we are faced with and we believe that our requested mitigation measures are reasonable and a small price to pay considering the negative impacts of your station to our property value and lives.

We have no doubt the men and women working at Station 32 are great people. However, a home is the largest investment many individuals make in their lifetime. We are simply seeking to protect this investment and do what we can to preserve our quality of life.

Please respond by September 16th as to you acceptance or rejection of our proposed additional mitigation and funding request.

Panel finds middle ground in Chevron property-value dispute

The property value of the Chevron Richmond refinery from 2004 to 2006 isn't what the oil company claimed, nor what the county assessor thought, the Contra Costa Assessment Appeals Board found after its two-year review.

The end result: Chevron overpaid property taxes by at least \$12.6 million at the refinery over the three years. If the oil company seeks a refund - it has not said whether it will -- cities, schools, parks and fire districts countywide that received property tax revenue could be asked to give back money they've already spent.

"A refund back to Chevron at a time when services are being cut would be devastating," Contra Costa Supervisor John Gioia said.

Chevron filed its tax appeal in 2007 because it disagreed with how the county assessed the refinery's land value and calculated its taxes. In 2004, the county assessed the land at \$2.5 billion, but Chevron says its assessment should have been \$600 million. In reality, the assessment in 2004 should have been \$2.1 billion, the appeals board ruled.

For 2005, the county's assessment was \$2.6 billion, compared with Chevron's estimate of \$940 million. The appeals board said it should be \$2.2 billion.

In 2006, the county's figure was \$2.7 billion; Chevron's estimate was \$1.14 billion. The appeals board's ruling: \$2.2 billion.

The complex issue dealt with land values broken down by the square foot, tax methodology, valuations and other technical matters. The appeals board reviewed mountains of records, listened to arguments and looked at different calculation approaches. The board ultimately found both Chevron and the county were off in their figures.

Richmond Realtor Joe Fisher, who sits on the appeals board, said board members were "very fair with it" as they reached a unanimous decision.

No one knows how the ruling will affect future assessments — or what it will mean for public agencies that get a cut of the property tax revenue each year. County Assessor Gus Kramer, who was disappointed in the ruling, said it will depend on the market.

Had the appeals board concurred with Chevron's assessments, the oil company would have been due a \$59.7 million refund. The board ruled for the lesser amount: Chevron has not said whether it will seek the refund.

"That's best left to discussions with the county," said Dean O'Hair, refinery spokesman. "We want to make sure this is implemented in a way that works for the county and all the taxing entities."

Those hardest hit by a refund would include the county at \$1.7 million, San Ramon Valley Unified School District at \$899,000 and Contra Costa County Fire Protection District at \$853,000,

according to the preliminary county figures. Richmond would be among the cities most heavily impacted at \$311,797.

The San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District, which could be asked to repay \$406,000, has known about the possibility of losing revenue for some time, spokeswoman Kim French said.

"We've put reserves aside for this purpose," French said. "We're prepared for it if it comes to that."



San Ramon Valley Firefighters Respond along with six area fire agencies to a 40 Acre Grass Fire

SAN RAMON, CA – The San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District responded, as part of multi-agency effort, to a vegetation fire in the East Bay Regional Parks Las Trampas Regional Wilderness today, August 5, 2009.

A jogger reported smoke in the area just after 2:00 pm and San Ramon Valley Fire crews were first on scene. The fire was fast moving and crews from San Ramon Valley Fire, Cal Fire, Alameda County Fire, Contra Costa County Fire, East Bay Parks Fire, Moraga Orinda Fire and East Bay Municipal Utilities District all worked to contain this 40 acre brush fire.

"The fire was contained quickly because of the cooperation between all the fire jurisdictions on scene," said Battalion Chief Mike Brown. "This fire had the potential of growing very quickly; with the coordinated effort from crews in the air and on the ground we were able to extinguish the fire in less than two hours."

The fire was completely contained at 3:59 pm and no injuries were reported and no structures threatened.

The cause of the fire is still under investigation.

San Ramon Valley Fire Presents a First of its Kind Training Demonstration

San Ramon Valley Fire is taking part in a first of its kind presentation today, Friday August 7, 2009, in Monterey. The Medical Education Technologies Incorporated (METI) Western Regional Conference will highlight a demonstration from San Ramon Valley Fire, Presidio Fire and American Medical Response (AMR) of Monterey County. This demonstration will illustrate the extrication of a high-tech manikin from a car, simulating a vehicle accident.

"What makes this demo different is the manikin inside the car, said Chris Eberle, Emergency Medical Services Specialist for San Ramon Valley Fire. The METIman was developed by paramedics to truly represent the human body and respond to trauma the way a real person would."

The METIman manikin is the first ever wireless, durable, fully contained human simulator that is based on real patient physiology. For example if the simulator develops a collapsed lung during a training session, the paramedics would then respond to the manikins change in condition just as they would to a patient out in the field.

While manikins with similar capabilities have been used in hospitals for many years, this is the first simulator that is designed specifically for first responders. It has the ability to be moved around, untethered, to truly represent a real life scenario from initial contact with a patient to in the field care and finally transport to the hospital.

Both San Ramon Valley Fire and The Fire Emergency Medical Consortium of Contra Costa County own older tethered versions of this simulator. Both organizations are eager to train with the new simulator and hope to purchase one in the future.

"Training this way is invaluable to our Paramedics, said Andy Swartzell, Emergency Services Coordinator for San Ramon Valley Fire. "We are honored to be part of the first ever public demonstration of this new innovative training tool."

San Ramon Valley Firefighters Responded to Second Alarm Barn Fire in Livermore

Livermore, CA – The San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District responded to a barn fire located on Marciel Road in Livermore, today at 2:51 p.m. A total of 5 engines, 2 water tenders, 4 Chief Officers, and one fire investigator, were dispatched to the scene. CalFire provided 6 engines, 2 dozers, 1 air attack, 2 air tankers, 2 handcrews, and 1 helicopter. A total of 90 personal were dispatched to the incident.

The first crew arrived to find the barn involved with fire and an adjacent wildland fire threatening several nearby structures. Firefighters immediately began an aggressive attack and were able to contain the fire by 3:49 p.m. Fire damage was limited to the barn and approximately 2 acres.

The barn was unoccupied at the time and the fire was reported to 911 emergency dispatch by several neighbors. There were no injuries reported. The cause is currently under investigation.


