Fire Prevention Week will be held October 9-15, 2011. This year's theme focuses on how to protect your family from fire by planning ahead and integrating simple things into your everyday life.

Installing systems such as smoke alarms and residential fire sprinklers, as well as identifying potential hazards, can reduce the risk of home fires and property loss, injury, or death due to fire. Nearly two-thirds of home structure fire deaths occur in homes where there was no smoke alarm or where smoke alarms were present but failed to operate

From October 9-15, fire safety advocates across the country will call to action for households to inspect their homes to ensure that their families are protected against fire. The San Ramon Valley Fire Prevention Division would like to lend our support by declaring October 9-15 as Fire Prevention Week in the San Ramon Valley.

In addition to Fire Prevention Week, we would like to deem the entire month of October "Fire Prevention Month" and celebrate with the following activities:

- The District will partner with the San Ramon Valley Unified School District to put on a District wide coloring contest promoting the Fire Prevention Week theme. One student in each grade level will win a ride to school in a fire truck.

Health Insurance Benefits, Elected Officials

#### Background:

Staff was asked to research and develop a health insurance option for elected officials that could be implemented at no cost to the District. Staff has worked with the California Public Employees Retirement System's health insurance department to create a plan that would allow Directors to have access to the CalPERS health plans. The Board approved the plan at the meeting of August 24, 2011.

After reviewing the District's implementation resolution, CalPERS has requested revised wording to conform to CalPERS standards. The revision does not change the program as approved by the Board in August.

The PERS recommended language is in the second "resolved" paragraph as follows:

RESOLVED, that the employer's contributions for each active or retired employee or survivor shall be the amount necessary to pay the full cost of his/her enrollment, including the enrollment of family members, in a health benefits plan or plans up to a maximum of PERS minimum contribution per month plus administrative fees and Contingency Reserve Fund assessments of the minimum employer contribution amount pursuant to Government Code 22892; and be it further...

All other wording/provisions of Resolution 2011-06 remain unchanged.

Replace Resolution 2011-6 and adopt the attached revised CalPERS implementation resolution.

- **RESOLVED**, that the Special District elects, and it does hereby elect, to be subject to the provisions of the Act; and be it further
- **RESOLVED**, that the employer's contribution for each active or retired employee or survivor shall be the amount necessary to pay the full cost of his/her enrollment, including the enrollment of family members, in a health benefits plan or plans up to a maximum of the minimum employer contribution amount pursuant to Government Code 22892; and be it further
- **RESOLVED**, that San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District has fully complied with any and all applicable provisions of Government Code Section 7507 in electing the benefits set forth above; and be it further
- **RESOLVED**, that the executive body appoint and direct, and it does hereby appoint and direct, the Administrative Services Director to file with the Board of Administration of the Public Employees' Retirement System a verified copy of this Resolution, and to perform on behalf of said Special District all functions required of it under the Act and Regulations of the Board of Administration; and be it further

I am writing to commend the efforts of the SRFD, and specifically applaud the on-going contributions and energies devoted by their representatives Debbie Vanek and Andrew Swartzell for their training programs to support our community's Caregivers and assist our efforts to provide the very best protection for our elderly residents.

Our Elders helped build and make our community great. And now the SRFD is assisting us to give them an increased sense of safety and security during their latter years with dependent needs.

My wife, Lovey, and I have attended SRFD's annual presentations at the Senior Center, their CPR and Emergency training sessions at the SRFD, and been inspired by Ms. Vanek to participate in the monthly Senior Care Work Group meetings hosted by the SRFD and conducted by Ms. Vanek. In all events, we have found their efforts to be professional, well organized and very informative.

As a point in evidence, all of our Caregivers have expressed their glowing gratitude for us having encouraged them to attend the Fire Extinguisher, Hands Only CPR, and AED Training sessions. The hands-on approach to training is what has been lacking in our own training programs. Our lectures have limitations, and are not as effective as the SRFD hands-on experience. (Seriously, who wants to deal with the mess a fire extinguisher creates in an otherwise beautifully landscaped backyard?)

As a result of our having attended their training programs, both our Caregivers and I feel far more confident in applying these techniques should an emergency arise.

I credit Andrew (`Andy') with helping me to overcome my fear of injuring someone while doing CPR chest compressions. He focused me on the fact that it would be better to save a life and maybe crack a rib, than to let someone die for lack of an attempt at CPR(!), and he addressed my liability concerns by reminding us of the Good Samaritan law.

- These programs are a wonderful use of our taxes as they help to address a serious need in our community.
- They assist us to prepare for the very best elder care possible during an emergency.
- They support our efforts to build a sense of an extended, caring family for our Elderly Residents and enhance the trust our Residents place in our staff and us.





#### Energy Conservation Program for Small Businesses Cuts Costs

A program initiated by the Imperial Irrigation District is expected to save small businesses in the area 25 percent of their energy costs over time. The Open for Business Small Business Direct Install Program is aimed at businesses in the area that use less than 100 kilowatts of power per month. Through the program, these businesses could receive up to \$2,500 to increase energy efficiency by replacing less efficient lighting, refrigeration and other equipment with more efficient equipment. Approximately 600 area businesses are set to be helped by the total \$1.6 million Imperial Irrigation District has assigned for the program. In order to participate, businesses fill out an application, then district officials perform an energy assessment to determine what energy efficiency modifications are required.

#### Foundation Formed to Extend Reach of Lifesaving Mobile Application

The San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District has announced the formation of the PulsePoint Foundation. The new nonprofit organization has been established to guide, enhance and expand the reach of the Fire Department CPR notification app released earlier this year. The Fire Department app empowers everyday citizens to provide life-saving assistance to victims of Sudden Cardiac Arrest. "The app crowd-sources Good Samaritans to events where the potential need for bystander CPR is high," says Fire Chief Richard Price. "PulsePoint is set to begin partnering with nearly two hundred fire and EMS agencies that have expressed interest in deploying the application in their communities." Although the application was pioneered and tested in the San Ramon Valley, the district has always been anxious to share its life saving potential. Forming an independent and external foundation to distribute and support the application will help facilitate and speed adoption by other communities.



Vallejo Sanitation and Flood Control District Goes Live with Solar Project

A solar project expected to save Vallejo Sanitation and Flood Control District about \$50,000 to \$70,000 a year in electric bills has gone fully operational. The project was custom engineered for installation on top of an existing in-ground flood control tank. The company who installed the system is also installing a custom security system and wrought iron fence for the perimeter. Web-based performance monitoring is also a part of the new solar project. Approximately 350,000 kilowatt hours will be generated per year. Once the power from the solar project is produced, it is fed into the electric grid and gives the district a credit for the power they generate. The system not only saves the district money, it offers substantial environmental henefits. It will offset over 7,200 rons of CO2, which equals the planting of over 120 acres of trees or taking 62 cars off the road for 25 years.

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## The Future of Heart Health



JACK PAROW

Jack Parow is the president of the International Association of Fire Chiefs. The retired fire chief in Chelmsford, Mass., Parow is a 33-year veteran of the fire service.

As president of the IAFC, I have had the privilege to travel around the United States and the world, meeting many of the current and future leaders in the fire/EMS field. I also have had the privilege to see many of the innovations and emerging technologies that will revolutionize fire and EMS as we know it. I firmly am convinced that our industry is in good hands and our future is strong.

Our future is not based solely on innovation or technology for their own sake; but, rather, on leveraging new tools and ideas to advance our capabilities and quality of service. Many fire and emergency service leaders are bringing innovation and emergency technology together right now, and they are reshaping the way we do business.

There is one example that I believe will truly revolutionize and improve the success rate of cardiacarrest victims beyond what we have ever seen before.

I look back over my career and see all the iterations that CPR has experienced. At the beginning, it was to train first responders in CPR. Next we trained tens of thousands of civilians to perform CPR while the first responders were en route.

Technology offered the next advancement in CPR, with the advent of semiautomatic and automatic defibrillators. Again, they first were used by fire and EMS personnel. This was followed by the distribution of defibrillators throughout our communities to be used by bystanders at the scene. All of this had a positive impact on the survival rate of cardiac arrest victims.

However, I believe the next two iterations that will revolutionize CPR and increase the survival rates stratospherically are dispatcher-aided/hands-only CPR and a smartphone application that will alert the bystander of a cardiac arrest event.

The hands-only resuscitation approach was started in Arizona in 2005 and overseen by the state's director of emergency services, Dr. Bently Bobrow. Under the new concept, dispatchers would instruct 911 callers to forget about mouth-

to-mouth resuscitation and simply do chest compressions. Responders treated primary cardiac arrests patients using a protocol that called for 100 compressions per minute for two minutes. This was followed by a single defibrillator shock and then another 200 compressions.

This was a really tough sell in the beginning because it was contrary to what had been the doctrine for so many years. But after collecting and analyzing the data, Arizona realized a much higher survival rate for cardiac arrest victims than the national average. Last fall, the American Heart Association issued new guidelines strongly recommending that 911 dispatchers instruct callers to use compression-only CPR.

The second piece to the puzzle regarding more successful CPR is bringing those trained and those in cardiac arrest together. Chief Richard Price and the members of the San Ramon Valley (Calif.) Fire Protection District are now replacing fate with modern technology. A free smartphone application will notify those willing to perform CPR and who are within 500 feet of the victim.

If the person receiving the notification chooses to respond, a map is displayed showing them their location, the location of the victim and the closest AED. (More information on how this system can work in your jurisdiction can be found at www.firedepartment.mobi.)

The innovation in tactics and the use of new technology each will show results on their own, but bringing the two together may create an even larger impact.

The future of the fire and emergency service is bright because there are leaders out there every day working to make it so. By nature, we are problem solvers, and therefore, each of us can be innovators. Innovation does not require a lot of resources or money — it just takes a little thought and a little courage to step out of the box.

Stay safe, be proud of what you do, and try to make a difference when you can.

- 3. Pension Cost: See attachment #2. Board of Directors Agenda Item 7.3. The financial impact of each of the actions is summarized in the report. It is too soon to predict the long-term actuarial impact of these changes.
- 4. Shared Training Center: San Ramon Valley Fire utilizes two training center sites through agreements with Contra Costa County Fire Protection District and the Livermore-Pleasanton Fire Department.
- 5. Equipment Maintenance Facility: San Ramon Valley Fire does not share a fire equipment repair facility with another agency. The District has a long range plan to construct a maintenance facility in conjunction with a fire training center. Sharing a maintenance facility does not provide operational or economic efficiencies for the District.
- 6. Shared Equipment/Supplies: The District shares a decontamination unit (Zimek) bought and used by both San Ramon Valle Fire and Moraga-Orinda Fire to decontaminate transport ambulances.
- 7. BLS/ALS Service: San Ramon Valley Fire provides both BLS and ALS care and transport.

### What Went Well

### 2011 Emergency Preparedness Fair

The 6th annual Emergency Preparedness Fair was held on Saturday, Scptember 10, 2011. The event team would like to thank the Board of Directors for their on-going support of this event. Again this year the San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District partnered with the City of San Ramon, Town of Danville, San Ramon Valley Unified School District and the LDS church to produce this well attended and important event. Major sponsors this year included AT&T, Joyce Feldman Farmer Insurance and San Ramon Regional Medical Center.

As in years past the focus of the event was to educate and encourage residents of our valley to get prepared. The Fair featured interactive booths, kid's activities, a free emergency supply for the first 500 guests, mobile pet licensing, fire extinguisher training, child car seat inspections, free preparedness classes, and tours of fire and police apparatus. Additionally, other highlights this year included the 352nd Combat Support Hospital out of Camp Parks, a mock shelter set up by the American Red, Hands Only CPR and AED use that trained 513 people and CERT demonstrations of each course training cycle

A large scale marketing effort was rolled out to promote attendance with the result being a record crowd of 4000.

### Residential Care Facility Working Group

The Residential Care Facility Working Group coordinated a free training for caregivers on the POLST (Physician Orders for Life Sustaining Treatment) form, use of fire extinguishers, and Hands Only CPR and AED use. There was also a presentation from San Ramon Regional's Stroke Program Coordinator on how to recognize stroke and what to do. caregivers were trained. This was the second training of this type and included 41 participants with the first session hosting 28 participants. Both trainings were extremely well received.

The RCFWG has identified and objective for the next year to promote Hands Only CPR and has teamed up with the San Ramon Valley HeartSafe Committee to help teach and educate the public in Hands Only CPR and AED use. RCFWG members volunteered to staff the HeartSafe booth at the San Ramon Art and Wind Festival, Danville Fine Arts Fair and the Emergency Prepardeness Fair.







### GENERAL FUND COMPARISON OF ACTUAL TO BUDGETED FISCAL YEAR 2011-12
