Excess Workers' Compensation Insurance – Final Audit Adjustment

Background:

The District is self insured for workers' compensation insurance. Routine claims are budgeted in the District's annual operating budget and paid as claims occur. The District also budgets a set-aside/contingency of \$1,000,000 for potentially large workers' compensation claims. In order to mitigate loss due to extraordinary claims, the District purchases excess workers' compensation insurance for expenses over and above the \$1,000,000 self-insured retention.

The cost for this excess insurance is based on rates associated with employee class codes (i.e., firefighter, clerical). The premium payment is calculated on the estimated payroll for the upcoming fiscal year. The premium for FY 2010-11 was \$215,078. At the conclusion of the policy year, an audit is conducted to determine the accuracy of the payroll estimate.

The audit of the FY 2010-11 policy year concluded that an adjustment was warranted in the amount of \$29,968.

Recommendation:

Authorize staff to pay the Excess Workers' Compensation Insurance final audit adjustment for FY 2010 in the amount of \$29,968.

California Redevelopment Association v. Matosantos - Oversight Board

Representation

Background:

The California Supreme Court delivered its decision in the California Redevelopment Association v. Matosantos case, finding the Dissolution Act constitutional and AB1x 27 (the "Alternative Redevelopment Program Act") unconstitutional. The Court's bifurcated decision means that all RDAs will be dissolved under the constitutional Dissolution Act, and none will have the opportunity to opt into continued existence under the unconstitutional Alternative Redevelopment Program Act.

The Court also determined to push back the deadlines in the Dissolution Act arising prior to May 1, 2012 by four months. For instance, all RDAs will be dissolved and their successor agencies will begin to function on February 1, 2012 under the Court's decision (as opposed to the October 1, 2011 deadline specified in the Dissolution Act itself).

The Court's decision is final effective immediately.

Present Situation:

As of February 1, 2012:

- Every RDA will be dissolved; and
- A Successor Agency will be created for each RDA.

The Successor Agency will be the Sponsoring Community of the RDA unless it elects not to serve in that capacity. In that case, the Successor Agency will be the first taxing entity submitting to the County Auditor-Controller a duly adopted resolution electing to become the Successor Agency.

The actions of the Successor Agency will be monitored, and in some cases approved, by an *Oversight Board*. The Oversight Board is generally intended to supervise the activities of the Successor Agency.

The Oversight Board has a fiduciary responsibility to holders of Enforceable Obligations and the taxing entities that benefit from distributions of property tax and other revenues as described below.

The Oversight Board of the Successor Agency will consist of 7 members appointed by/representing:

- County Board of Supervisors (two members);
- Mayor (one member);
- County Superintendent of Education (one member);
- Chancellor of California Community Colleges (one member);
- Largest special district taxing entity (one member); and
- A former RDA employee appointed by Mayor/Board of Supervisors (one member).

Under the Court's decision, the Oversight Board membership must be completed by May 1, 2012.

The Dissolution Act requires the Oversight Board to direct the Successor Agency to determine whether contracts, agreements or other arrangements between the former RDA and private parties should be terminated or renegotiated to reduce the Successor Agency's liabilities and to increase net revenues to the taxing entities.

The actions of the Oversight Board of each Successor Agency will in turn be overseen by the Director of the Department of Finance and may be subject to disapproval or modification. The Oversight Board has specified obligations with respect to maintaining a website and providing specified notification to various state officials.

Recommendation:

As the largest special district taxing entity within the Town of Danville and the City of San Ramon, Staff recommends that the Fire Chief be appointed by the Board of Directors to represent the District on each Oversight Board. Staff also recommends that District Counsel serve as the alternate representative.

Background:

Staff identified in the FY 11/12 Budget the need to make transitory improvements to the existing Training Site at 6100 Tassajara Rd., including a modern classroom facility and training props. The District allocated \$300,000 from the Training Facility Fund to finance all aspects of this project, which include architect services, engineering, permits and construction.

District staff advertised the project and received 17 bids from qualified construction companies. After review of lowest bidder and verification of qualifications, Southland Construction Management will be chosen to provide construction services.

Southland Construction Management is to provide all equipment, labor and materials for the construction of the Training Facility Remodel, according to plans and specifications.

Anticipated start date of the Training Facility Remodel is March 1, 2012. Estimated completion is no later than June 30, 2012.

Dear Ms. Jamison

I am in receipt of your letter of 6 February 2012, requested through Chief Price. Thank you for the information on the "General Requirements for an Educational Occupancy (Private School)" I have reviewed these items, and it seems the Grange Hall is in conformance with these requirements, with the exception of item one "Provide documentation that the proposed use is acceptable within the planning and zoning regulations of the Town of Danville". This is a new requirement to me, and I ask that you provide me with the exact statutory law or regulation that requires this.

Second, on or about 9 November 2011, and again on 25 February 2012 members of your bureau suddenly appeared at the Grange Hall without warning and confronted our sitting tenant. At the 25 February confrontation your personnel basically evicted this tenant (a small private preschool with about 4 children). There was no prior warning of these "raids", nor was there any communication of any kind with the Grange either before or after these events. The tenant has now left, not wishing to deal with further harassment from you. I cannot blame them. But their departure leaves a gaping hole in the Grange finances, and thus our non-profit work with the youth and women of this community. I don't want this to reoccur. The Grange is quite prepared to work cooperatively to ensure required fire safety to all tenants, as required by actual statute or legal regulation, but we have to know about it. So far, we have been met by silence.

I request that you provide me with the following so that we can avoid further unpleasant interactions with your bureau: exactly what statutory authority are you claiming for these "raids", and what specific violations do you claim? Who authorized these raids, and on what basis? Why was the Grange, the owner of the building, never contacted either before or after these unpleasant raids? And why was the Grange not provided with an opportunity to make necessary corrections before you imposed the abrupt and draconian closure of this small school?

So there are no further misunderstandings, I request and require that you securely maintain all written, electronic, or other forms of communication with any party about these two events.
