Authorization for payment of annual EBRCS subscriber fees

#### Background:

The East Bay Regional Communications System Authority (EBRCSA) was officially created in 2007 with the formation of a Joint Powers Authority (JPA) to procure and maintain an Association of Public Safety Communications Officials (APCO) P25-compliant communications system. This communications system provides interoperable communications to public agencies serving Contra Costa and Alameda Counties. EBRCS includes 43 member agencies serving a population of over 2.5 million people. Representatives from both counties have worked together on this project for over six years. The extensive infrastructure required for the communications system was funded through numerous federal and state grants along with debt proceeds.

#### **Debt Service Payment**

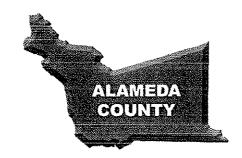
The EBRCSA requires a debt service payment, separate from the operating payment, to contribute toward the debt service of the EBRCS infrastructure. Prior to signing the original Project Operating Agreement, participating agencies had the opportunity to prepay the debt service payment at a cost of \$1,400 per radio. If the agency did not prepay the debt service payment, the agency would be required to make an annual debt service payment of \$180 per radio. The District opted to prepay the debt service payment for all 262 radios that will be in service on the EBRCS and will not be required to make a debt service payment at this time. If the District purchases new radios and adds them to the EBRCS, the annual debt service payment of \$180 per radio, as well as the operating payment, will be required for the new radios.

#### **Operating Payment**

Per the EBRCSA Project Operating Agreement, each year the District is required to make an operating payment to the EBRCSA that is calculated based on the total number of radios that subscribers have committed to place in service on the system. The operating payment allows District personnel to utilize P25-compliant, trunked radios on the EBRCS system for 12 months. For fiscal year 2013-2014, the annual operating cost per radio is \$300. The District will be utilizing 262 radios on the EBRCS for fiscal year 2013-2014 and is required to make an operating payment of \$78,600. The fiscal year 2013-2014 budget includes \$78,600 for the EBRCS operating fees.

#### **Recommended Board Action:**

Authorize staff to pay the EBRCSA operating payment in the amount of \$78,600.

Appropriations Limit for Fiscal Year 2013-2014

#### Background:

Each year the District is required by State Law to adopt an Appropriations Limit (Limit) in conjunction with the budget process. The Fiscal Year 2013-2014 Appropriations Limit is calculated by multiplying the adopted Limit for the prior year by a set of factors to create a new limit. This Limit may also be referred to as the Gann Limit or Proposition 4 Limit. The Appropriations Limit for Fiscal Year 2013-2014 exceeds, by a significant amount, the Appropriations which are subject to the Limit.

The laws regulating the application of the Limit forbid an agency from appropriating specific funds that would exceed the Limit. The restriction applies to appropriating monies categorized as "Proceeds of Taxes." The Limit carries forward each year and is subject to an adjustment in accordance with a specified formula. As part of the annual audit procedures, the City's independent Auditors also review the calculation and report any findings.

The annual adjustment to the Limit is based on a formula that uses the following factors (the District has the discretion to choose one factor from each category below):

#### <u>CATEGORY A – CHANGE IN POPULATION</u>

- Change in District population; or
- Change in population for the entire County;

#### <u>CATEGORY B - CHANGE IN STATE INCOME or LOCAL NON-RESIDENTIAL VALUATION</u>

- Change in State Per Capita income; or
- Change in non-residential assessed valuation.

#### 2013-2014 Appropriations Limit

Staff has prepared the calculations necessary to determine the Limit for Fiscal Year 2013-2014 in accordance with State Law and with the Uniform Guidelines of the League of California Cities. The discretionary factors selected in calculating the FY 2013-2014 Limit are: (1) Change in the District population; and (2) Change in State Per Capita Income. The new Fiscal Year 2013-2014 Appropriations Limit is \$134,022,261, based upon an increased adjustment factor of 6.266% applied to the 2012-2013 Limit. The Fiscal Year 2013-2014 budget includes appropriations totaling \$49,264,960 that would be categorized as "Proceeds of Taxes" and thus subject to the Limit. Therefore, the appropriations subject to the Limit are \$84,757,301 below the legal limit.

#### **Recommended Board Action:**

Approve the Appropriations Limit of \$134,022,261 for Fiscal Year 2013-2014.

#### Financial Impacts:

There is no financial impact since the appropriations subject to the Limit are well below the spending limit.

Resolution No. 2013-07 Amending Procedures for Administering Employee

Contributions to the Contra Costa County Employees' Retirement Assn.

#### Background:

The District provides retirement benefits to eligible employees under the Contra Costa County Employees' Retirement Association ("CCCERA"). Both employees and the District contribute funding to CCCERA. Employees contribute via paycheck deductions called "pick-ups". Under section 414(h)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code, these deductions, or pick-ups, qualify for pretax status. The District memorializes the deductions in a "414(h)(2) Resolution." In the most recent negotiations with labor, concluded earlier in 2013, the District negotiated an additional employee pick-up of employer contributions as a means of realizing employee salary concessions. Staff is proposing that the Board modify the District's existing 414(h)(2) Resolution to include the recent concessions.

The District's current 414(h)(2) Resolution pertains to deductions for member contributions to CCCERA. In order to further clarify the nature and status of employee pick-ups since the recent MOU was approved, the attached resolution would specify the following:

- The following deductions from District employees' compensation are designated as "employee contributions":
  - a. deductions for member contributions under CCCERA
  - b. deductions for employer contributions under CCCERA.
- Although designated as employee contributions and deducted from employees'
  compensation, the contributions will, for tax purposes, be characterized as
  "picked up" by the District in accordance with section 414(h)(2) of the Code and
  will be treated as paid by the District in lieu of contributions by the employee.
- Employees will not have the option of choosing, directly or indirectly, to receive the contributions instead of having them paid by the District to CCCERA.

- The District will pay to CCCERA the contributions designated as employee contributions from the same source of funds as used in paying salary.
- Contributions picked up under this resolution will be tax deferred to the extent provided under the Internal Revenue Code, Treasury Regulations, and other guidance issued thereunder.

#### Recommended Board Action:

Adopt Resolution No. 2013-07 amending procedures for administering employee contributions to the Contra Costa County Employees' Retirement Association.

#### Fiscal Impact:

This action has no financial impact to the District and serves only to clarify the tax status of employee contributions to CCCERA.

## A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE SAN RAMON VALLEY FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT TO TAX DEFER MEMBER PAID RETIREMENT CONTRIBUTIONS – IRC 414(H)(2) EMPLOYER PICK-UP

WHEREAS, the San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District ("District") provides retirement benefits to eligible employees under the Contra Costa County Employees' Retirement Association ("CCCERA"); and

WHEREAS, amounts are deducted from District employees' compensation in order to fund benefits under CCCERA; and

WHEREAS, under Section 414(h)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code (Code) and related guidance from the Internal Revenue Service, such deductions from employees' compensation qualify for pre-tax treatment only if the District takes formal action to designate the deductions, for tax purposes, as "pick-up" contributions; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with Section 414(h)(2) of the Code, the Board of Directors of the District previously adopted Resolution No. 2008-08, confirming the District's "pick-up" and payment of certain retirement contributions on behalf of District employees and confirming, among other things, how these contributions would be treated for State and Federal tax purposes under Internal Revenue Code Section 414(h)(2); and

WHEREAS, in addition to the deductions described in the preceding paragraph, the District may, to the extent permitted by the law and the District's memoranda of understanding or similar agreements with employees, deduct employees' compensation to pay employer contributions to CCCERA; and

WHEREAS, the District wishes to adopt this resolution in order to (1) ratify, consolidate, and further clarify its prior Resolutions concerning pick-up contributions, and (2) in accordance with Section 414(h)(2) of the Code, designate amounts deducted from employees' compensation to pay employer contributions to CCCEAR as pick-up contributions.

**THEREFORE**, be it resolved by San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District Board of Directors that:

- A. The following deductions from District employees' compensation are hereby designated as "employee contributions": (1) deductions for regular member contributions under CCCERA, and (2) deductions for employer contributions under CCCERA.
- B. Although designated as employee contributions and deducted from employees' compensation, the contributions will, for tax purposes, be characterized as "picked up" by the District in accordance with Section 414(h)(2) of the Code and will be treated as paid by the District in lieu of contributions by the employee.

- C. Employees will not have the option of choosing, directly or indirectly, to receive the contributions instead of having them paid by the District to CCCERA.
- D. The District will pay to PERS the contributions designated as employee contributions from the same source of funds as used in paying salary.
- E. Contributions picked up under this resolution will be tax deferred to the extent provided under the Code, Treasury Regulations, and other guidance issued thereunder.

#### Background:

The District acquired the Hemme Property in 2005 as a potential replacement site for Fire Station No. 32 or possibly as a new station site to be called the Alamo west station.

After further review of response times in the Station 32 coverage area, it was determined that the existing Station 32 site was the most appropriate location for construction of a new fire station and that construction of new Alamo west and Alamo east stations would not be necessary.

The Hemme Property was purchased in December 2005 for \$929,961.93 from the proceeds of the District 2006 Certificates of Participation ("COP"). As the Hemme Property is not needed for station construction or for any other purpose described in the COP official statement, it would be appropriate for the District to dispose of the Hemme Property as surplus property in accordance with State Law and District policy/practice.

#### Financial Impact:

Once the Hemme Property is sold or otherwise disposed of, the proceeds would need to be handled in accordance with the covenant of the COP official statement and IRS requirements for tax exempt status. Bond Counsel (Jones Hall) previously advised the District that the proceeds from a sale of the Hemme Property acquired with COP funds should be redeposited into the COP construction fund. The redeposited funds may be used for any project identified in the official statement.

#### Staff Recommendation:

#### Staff recommends that the Board:

- 1. Adopt Resolution No. 2013-09 declaring the Hemme Property to be surplus District property.
- 2. Authorize and direct Staff to dispose of the Hemme Property in accordance with State Law and District policy.
- 3. Direct Staff to deposit proceeds of the sale of the Hemme Property into the 2006 COP construction fund.

Authorization to contract for GIS services

#### Background

Effective August 16th, 2013, the District's GIS Analyst resigned, leaving a vacancy in the Support Services Division. The District's GIS Analyst is responsible for the management and administration of geospatial data, including the integration and maintenance of commonly used GIS data within shared enterprise databases. The District's GIS data include a Computer-aided Dispatch (CAD) map, mobile maps, administrative boundaries, county addressing and parcel boundaries, hydrants, fire trails, auto aid areas, etc. The GIS Analyst plays a pivotal role in the creation and maintenance of Emergency Service Zones (ESZ) and conducts comprehensive analysis of the GIS data, recommending options for optimizing the deployment of the District's fire and EMS resources. Additionally, the GIS Analyst stages all spatial data elements, including addresses, parcel data, inspection areas and weed abatement zones, within the Fire Prevention database.

The GIS Analyst position was created in 2005 due to the growing demands placed on Suppression staff to maintain the District's GIS data during a period of significant growth in the San Ramon Valley. The analyst filling the position was responsible for developing the GIS program by upgrading to an industry-standard software platform and creating the template for the District's station wall maps, run books, preplan books, hydrant inspection maps and damage assessment guides. The analyst also played an integral role in a significant revision of the District's emergency services deployment plan, CAD upgrade, the creation of the Standards of Cover (SOC) document for Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI) accreditation and an Insurance Services Office (ISO) evaluation.

#### <u>Information</u>

The GIS Analyst plays an essential role in supporting Suppression, Communications and Fire Prevention staff with accurate and current mapping data. Although an indispensable component of emergency services, the District's GIS program is now developed and today's economic climate is notably different with considerably less construction in the San Ramon Valley. These conditions provide an opportunity to utilize consulting services in the short term to evaluate the GIS priorities of the District. In order to address the vacancy, staff requests authorization to retain the services of a GIS consulting firm or independent consultant at an hourly rate between \$45-\$110 per hour to maintain the District's GIS data and continue to provide staff with essential and timely GIS information. The range in the hourly

compensation will allow staff to determine the appropriate combination of skills required to address the prescribed task. The total compensation per year paid to the consulting firm or independent consultant will be capped at the previous salary compensation, not including benefits, of the full-time GIS Analyst position. Staff will continue to monitor the GIS needs of the District in order to appropriately and effectively address them in a cost-effective manner.

#### Recommendation

Authorize staff to retain the services of a GIS consulting firm or independent consultant to fill the GIS Analyst vacancy.

Approval of Employee Health Insurance Opt-Out Plan

#### Background:

One of the initiatives of the 2013 collective bargaining process was an effort to reduce the District's cost of providing health insurance to employees and retirees. The new agreement with labor establishes a cap on the District's monthly premium obligation, and sets forth an 8% premium contribution by participants.

Another option for mitigating the District's cost for health insurance is to offer employees the option of declining health insurance coverage if they have access to insurance from another source (i.e., spouse). As an incentive to participants, it is suggested that the District offer a payment of \$300 per month for those who can opt-out of the District paid health insurance program.

Attached for the Board's consideration is a draft of the "Employee Health Insurance Opt-Out Plan." Local 3546 has not completed their review of the plan; therefore, the opt-program will initially apply to non-represented employees only.

#### **Recommended Board Action:**

Staff recommends the Board approve the "Employee Health Insurance Opt-Out Plan" effective with the 2013 open enrollment period for health benefits.

## San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District Employee Health Insurance Opt-Out Plan

The Opt-Out policy for the San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District ("District") is for employees eligible to be enrolled in the Health Benefits Plan under the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital Care Act.

This Opt-Out plan is only available for employees who can provide evidence of coverage under another plan.

An employee may Opt-Out of benefits coverage if they are already covered elsewhere (i.e. under a spouse's health care plan) under the provisions noted below. The District will reimburse the employee the amount listed below each month through payroll for completely opting out (self coverage plus dependent coverage if applicable) of the Health Benefits Plan under the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital Care Act. In order for employees to participate in the Opt-Out reimbursement plan, employees must annually show proof of coverage for themselves and/or dependents.

The monthly Opt-Out payment effective July 1, 2013 is \$300 per month.

Making false statements about satisfying eligibility criteria, proof of coverage of dependent health care, failing to notify the District of loss of eligibility or loss of coverage elsewhere, and not providing documentation when requested will lead to de-enrollment and possible action to recover amounts paid during the period of ineligibility via payroll deduction.

If at any time during the plan year, the employee loses coverage for themselves or dependants under another plan, the employee shall notify the District within 15 business days. The employee may be required to provide proper documentation to enroll themselves and/or dependant(s) in the District health plans. The District's insurance providers may also require proof of lost coverage.

The choice to opt-out of District medical coverage is an annual election. If an employee chooses to re-enroll into the District's medical insurance plan, they may do so during any annual Open Enrollment period – effective the following January 1.

By signing the *Medical Insurance Coverage Waiver Form*, the employee agrees to the terms and provisions of this Opt-Out policy.

**EMS Specialist Temporary Assignment** 

#### Background:

On May 1, 2013, the previous EMS Specialist transferred to the Suppression Division and entered the San Ramon Valley Fire Protection District Firefighter Recruit Academy. Since then, the EMS Specialist position has been left unfilled. The Board approved the filling of this critical position and interviews with several qualified, outside (PEPRA), candidates were conducted. Through these interviews, the District found two finalists who could fill the current position at a basic level. Upon further consideration, Staff identified an opportunity to reevaluate the EMS Specialist position to align the capabilities of the EMS Specialist with the future expectations and challenges facing the EMS Division. Finding a person with the requisite knowledge, skills and abilities who can conduct the daily tasks necessary as well as assist the rest of the Division with EMS research, systems analysis, strategic consultation, and broad-based networking will be essential for the future success of District EMS. In order have time to adequately evaluate the position needs and the organizational structure of the EMS Division, as well as continue to maintain the current exemplary District EMS service levels, Staff has sought out interested internal candidates and identified a Suppression Captain with strong systems background and internal knowledge who could provide just such a service on a temporary basis. Staff believes that for a successful structural evaluation, the temporary reassignment of a Suppression Captain to an internal EMS Specialist for a six to twelve month period is necessary and that to facilitate this temporary assignment, no change in rank status or in pay status should occur.

#### **Recommended Board Action:**

Staff recommends the Board approve a Temporary Assignment Equalization Pay (TAEP), differential for up to twelve months, for the purpose of filling the EMS Specialist position on a temporary basis. A TAEP of 9%, calculated off of the employee's Premium Base Monthly Salary will neither increase nor decrease the pay of a 56-hour Suppression employee reassigned to a 40-hour schedule.

#### **Financial Impacts:**

The Suppression Division vacancy created by this temporary reassignment will be filled with overtime. The increased cost of utilizing a Suppression Captain to temporarily fill the EMS Specialist position, partially offset by the use of overtime to fill the Suppression vacancy, along with the savings realized by the five months that the EMS Specialist position has been unfilled, makes the financial impact to the District a net savings of \$38,000, on a fiscal calendar basis.

Fire Chief Meyer:

Early on the morning of Monday August 27<sup>th</sup>, 2012, my husband Barry Nauroth was struck in the driver door of his car by a DUI juvenile in his SUV speeding 50 mph through the controlled neighborhood intersection of La Serena and Danville Boulevard in Alamo. Hit and run. Barry was left to die.

Neighbors Byron and Elvia Cordoba called 911. Captain Richard Huettis and his team cut Barry from the wreckage and took him to John Muir Walnut Creek. The admitting report described Barry's body as crushed, his brain bleeding, blood loss acute, condition poor. Son Shawnacy, a Newark police officer for ten years, was the first to arrive at John Muir and did not expect his dad to survive.

But Barry survived.

After 24 days in ICU, 51 days of hospitalization, I took him home on October 17<sup>th</sup> in a wheelchair, in a leg brace, in a cervical collar, in a gastrostomy binder, in diapers, irrational from brain trauma, unable to care for himself.

Saturday morning December 1<sup>st</sup> Barry flew out of bed in a violent seizure. His head slammed the baseboard and he landed face down and immobile. I couldn't tell if was breathing, I didn't know if his cervical fusion had held. I was panicked and called 911. Captain Huettis and his emergency team came to our home and took Barry to Kaiser Walnut Creek. Scans showed no further trauma.

It's now August 2013 and we are in recovery with challenges ahead.

Barry is a son, a brother, a father, a cherished friend, a valued business associate, a war veteran medic, Grandpa Barry to 11 children. We are all humbled and profoundly grateful for the hundreds - truly hundreds - of skilled and dedicated professionals who have kept Barry with us. You were the first caregivers. You made future possible.

## <u>Activities</u>

## Fire Resistant Garden Project

Corey Barlow, a local Eagle Scout candidate, has completed the first two phases of his "fire resistant" garden project. The project began over a year ago, Corey along with his sponsor, Jeff Smith, embarked on a plan to install a fire resistant garden in the back patio area of the Administration Building.

Over the past year Corey has researched fire resistant plantings, worked with a local landscape architect, raised funds, leveraged sponsorships, recruited volunteers and put together two work days to install the garden. On Saturday, August 31, over 30 volunteers prepared the area for planting and on Saturday, September 7 the volunteers complete the planting phase. The final step will be to create signage that will list the plant type and its fire resistant properties.

The garden will serve as a teaching tool for residents; it will encourage homeowners to consider plants that have fire resistant and often drought tolerant characteristics. The garden will be included in the Community Personal Emergency Preparedness classes as well as all Wildfire Readiness presentations.

#### **CPR** in the Schools Program Update

In the winter and spring of the 2014 School year all  $7^{th}$  graders will have the opportunity to learn Hands-Only CPR and the proper use of an AED. The  $7^{th}$  grade CPR program will kick off at the October Middle School Principals meeting where each school will be given the opportunity to schedule a training day for their students.

Four teams of 8 volunteers will commit to teaching at two of the Middle Schools, for a total of eight presentation days instructing approximately 2400 students. The Fire District and the HeartSafe Committee has committed to aid in the recruitment of volunteers, provide Train the

Trainer classes for all volunteers and provide at least one uniformed Fire District employee at each training day. The School District will also aid in volunteer recruitment, will partner to purchase and maintain a cache of supplies (CPR manikins, mats, AED trainers, etc) for the program.

In addition, the HeartSafe Committee will be offering the Hands-Only CPR training program at high school football games during half-time.

#### RCFE Evacuation Video Update

The RCF video production has made significant strides toward completion. In June and July, CCO Debbie Vanek and FS Kim French worked within the Access and Functional Needs Committee of the SRVEPCCC to develop the script for the video. In August, the video was filmed over 4 days at two care homes located in Danville and San Ramon. Thus far, the five primary committee members involved have dedicated over 500 hours to the project. Approximately 56 people were involved in the video production, including staff members, volunteers, actors and production personnel. FS Joyce Castro, dispatchers and crews also took part in the filming and support of the video. At this time the video is in the editing stage and the target date for completion is the end of October.

## Exterior Hazard Abatement Program Update

The annual EHAP is near completion. The program included inspection of over 11,700 properties. This was a team effort and inclusive of all fire prevention staff participating in the initial inspection activity. FP Staff are currently working with 4 property owners that are in the process of removing dead trees. There have been 2 properties abated by the District contractor.

They did not see anyone running from the area, and two of the three were individuals that had attempted to extinguish the fire. The case was classified as arson.

Date/time: July 4, 2013 at 2157 hours Location: Behind 9961 Mangos Drive Occupancy Type: Park/Open Space

Area of Origin: Along Iron Horse Trail, fire traveled laterally on both sides of the paved roadway

Cause: Arson, unsafe use of illegal fireworks

**Summary:** Dispatched to 9961 Mangos Drive, upon arrival E34 had a small vegetation fire and continued two units for support. DFM 3121 arrived with Battalion 31 and found a large party in the backyard of 9961 Mangos. It was difficult to see and it was decided I would return the next day to complete the investigation. I returned to fireworks patrols for the evening. A firework device was found immediately adjacent to the Iron Horse Trail. The fire had burned approximately a half acre. The case was classified as arson.

was classified as incendiary. Approximately ½ acre burned. Cause: Arson, unsafe use of illegal firework (bottle rockets)

Date/time: July 8, 2013 at 23:36 hours

Location: Iron Horse Trail x of Ridgewood Road

Occupancy Type: Park/Open Space Area of Origin: Undetermined

Cause: Arson, individuals constructed a balloon bomb utilizing balloons, and illegal fireworks

(bottle rockets) as a detonator.

Summary: Engine 32 responded to a vegetation fire at Iron Horse Trail and Ridgewood Road, fire was contained to approximately 600 sq ft. Upon review Engine 32's narrative in the daily report, DFM Stevens contact Captain Barragan. Captain Barragan indicated that the neighbors reported an huge explosion followed by a fire along the Iron Horse Trail. DFM Stevens went to the site and interview neighbors and passerby's. Everyone contacted indicated that the explosion was huge, and some were curious how bad the person(s) were hurt. Neighbors reported that kids on bikes were seen riding away from the incident. Upon examination of the area, melted balloons were found and a firework device. These were approximately 50 feet from the fire. The case was classified as arson.
